

SWE 60; Charlotte-Metrolina 10

With the 60th anniversary of the Society of Women Engineers, a new award, the SWE History Award, was established by National in an effort to gather historical information about SWE, its Regions, and its individual Sections. It just so happens that the Charlotte-Metro-

lina Section celebrates the 10th anniversary of its reinstatement this year as well. With this in mind, we want to share a little of our history for those who may not know it.

Charlotte-Metrolina Section was granted its original charter on May 2, 1982 with geographical boundaries of North Carolina zip codes 280-282 and 286-288. North Carolina zip code 289 was added October 1-3, 1982. The Section was active for approximately six years before being declared inactive by the Society Board of Directors on May 13, 1989.

In late March 1998, MAL Member Kellie Hedrick discovered that Charlotte had

once had a SWE Section. With help from HQ and then Zip Code Coordinator, Claire Shortall, Kellie rounded up interested former members, local MAL members, and co-workers. process, we also had the SC zip code 297 released from the Western Carolina Section based in Greenville-

Spartanburg our section.

On May 12, 1999, fourteen 'SWE-CM' members and pending members met at Rio Bravo Restaurant on South Boulevard, Charlotte, NC to sign the Petition to Charter a Section of the Society of Women En-

gineers.

Charlotte-Metrolina Section was granted its reinstatement charter on August 28, 1999 with our current geographical boundaries of North Carolina zip codes 280-282 and South Carolina zip code 297.

As time passed and the economy waxed and waned, members have come and gone. However, we can boast that two of the original 14 petitioners are still current members of our section: Kerrie Goforth and Helene Hilger.

Take Charge of Your Career and Your Life

On January 15 and 29, five members and five non-members met during their lunch hour to view the Webinar "Take Control of Your Career and Your Life" with Marcus Buckingham.

The webinar was focused on learning what you could do to take control of your life and career. The group that originally had this seminar did some prework (available for you as well) and came in with some defined areas that were not working for them in their careers and lives. The first part of the webinar got us to look at definitions we use in a different way. Strengths and weaknesses were the first topic covered with new definitions.

First, the concept of asking others about your strengths and weaknesses was overturned with the idea that no one knows you better than yourself. Everyone else has an opinion but you know the truth about you.

Next, the definition of a strength is what energizes you, not just what you are good at. Remember you can be very good at doing something but it may not energize you. A weakness is defined as something that drains you. One person realized that

what they had been doing for their entire career drained them! What a revelation and what a new direction she will be tak-

The next concept was new for a lot of the group that attended. Focus on your strengths and find a way to work around your weaknesses. Forget about "fixing" your weaknesses and grow your strengths. This allows you to volunteer for things that energize you, work on things that energize you. All of this instead of focusing on what drains you!

Once these were defined and the group identified their strengths and weaknesses, a plan was put in place on how to incorporate these into the next week. Nothing huge or overwhelming, just one way to use your strengths more and focus on your weaknesses less. This plan was to be reviewed weekly and adjusted to continue to increase the use of your strengths and lessen the weaknesses so that at some point, all you are working on is your strengths and by definition, only working on things that energize you. Reality is we all have to continue to do some things that we don't like or that drain us, but we can all work to increase the time we have using our strengths.

HONOR PIN

Angela Berry received the Honor Pin, the third highest national award for adult Girl Scouts, from the Girl Scouts Hornets' Nest Council on March 30, 2010. The Honor Pin honors those who delivered outstand-

ing service to two or more geographic areas or program delivery audiences. The service goes beyond the expectations for the position. Nomination for the award required submission of a Nomination Form and 3 Letters of Endorsement to the GSHNC Board.

Angela established a collaboration be-

tween Girl Scout Hornets' Nest Council and the Society of Women Engineers Charlotte-Metrolina Section and created the Engineers Are Cool! program for Junior Girl Scouts in 2005. She coordinates the Engineers Are Cool! program twice a year at the POD Village, serving more than 400 girls, with a staff exclusively of volunteers.

Angela helped create an exciting, handson curriculum exposing girls to mechanical, structural, civil, electrical and chemical engineering in a fun and approachable manner and incorporates college students and professionals into the event to expose girls to educational and career opportunities.

Her volunteer efforts have saved more than 150 hours of staff time for Girl Scouts, Hornets' Nest Council.

Women's Health Meeting: "Your Health: Focus On Wellness"

The topic for the meeting was Osteoporosis Symptoms and Prevention. Mary Rachui, an RN and Women's Health Nurse Practioner presented the program. Mary works with Presbyterian Hospital in the Women's Health Education Program.

Mary covered the definition of osteoporosis and gave us information about other diseases that are similar and usually lead to osteoporosis. Each attendee received a folder with information and several flyers on bone density and how to increase and/or maintain good bone density. The key items she covered were the need to increase calcium intake since your body quits storing calcium around age 25. She covered the different types of calcium and suggested we talk with our doctors about which type is best for

able for bone density which is used for the diagnosis of Osteoporosis. Again, she asked us to check with our

doctors to determine which test is best for each of us.

Different factors influence the probability of developing osteoporosis. The build of your body is one factor that surprised most of us at the meeting. A slender build is more likely to develop osteoporosis than a stocky build. Heredity influences this as well, if Mom has it most likely you will have it. But most of all diet and exercise influence this most. A healthy diet with a good exercise routine that includes weight bearing activity is best.

Overall Mary encouraged us to continue to educate ourselves on different health issues and was pleased to help in any way she could.



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Call for Nominations: 2010 Distinguished Engineering Service Award

Sponsored by: SWE~Charlotte-Metrolina Section

This award is presented annually by the Society of Women Engineers Charlotte-Metrolina Section to an individual who best exemplifies the engineering profession through leadership and service as judged by the selection committee from submitted nominations.

The judging criteria evaluate the contributed time and effort in one or more of the following areas:

- Public service application of professional abilities in volunteering (i.e. tutoring, MathCounts, science fairs, public boards etc)
- Public Awareness acceptance/promotion of the engineering profession (i.e. speaker bureau, career guidance, outreach activities)
- Professional Development and Leadership – advancement of the profession (i.e. helping with engineering exams, career planning, teaching technical continuing education courses, engineering legislative concerns, engineering advancement committees, engineering organization positions, etc.)

• Other – as specified by the nominator

Nominee's volunteer efforts must be:

- current, as opposed to several years ago
- an investment of substantial personal (uncompensated) time
- personal and direct, as opposed to financial support
- public service, as opposed to in conjunction with services for family members

Nominees should be informed of his/ her nomination or may nominate themselves. The current section President and Award chair are exempt from nomination.

Award will be presented at the Society of Women Engineers Charlotte-Metrolina Section Awards and Recognition Banquet held on June 11, 2010.

The nomination form may be found on our website. Nominations must be received by Selection Committee at Charlotte.Metrolina @ swe.org no later than May 15, 2010.
